Friendship Tree – Eastwick Park Avenue

On the 1st October an unveiling ceremony of a plaque took place outside 5 Eastwick Park Avenue and the wording reads as follows: The Royal Canadian Engineers planted this friendship tree, a red leafed maple representing Canada and a green leafed maple representing Great Britain in the grounds of Southey Hall whilst they were based in Bookham during the second world war (1939-45) – commemorated by The Bookhams Residents Association – 2005.

There was a sizeable gathering including our MP, Sir Paul Beresford, and a number of our Councillors, together with a few people who had had relations serving with the Royal Canadian Engineers. Our Chairman, Peter Seaward, opened the proceedings and mentioned that the tree would have been planted adjacent to the drive leading to Southey Hall (previously known as Eastwick House – now demolished) and the gates of which can still be seen outside No. 182a Lower Road. Apparently the tree would have been near to the guardhouse at the entrance to the camp with a large tank park on the opposite side of Eastwick Park Avenue.

Ron Smith, a local historian, was very helpful when we were researching the subject and he very kindly agreed to unveil the plague. However, before doing so, he gave the gathering a most interesting talk about his boyhood memories whilst he was billeted at Bookham during the war years, which including an unsolved mystery. 'D-Day' on 6th June 1944 was the largest sea invasion that has ever taken place involving over 5,000 ships and 200,000 vehicles. The whole success of this invasion depended upon absolute secrecy, especially the location of the landing beaches. MI5 were horrified to find that answers to the Daily Telegraph crosswords for the weeks before D-Day included not only the code words for the beaches but the secret words 'Mulberry', 'Neptune' and 'Overlord'. The writer of the crossword, who was arrested, was the headmaster of a London School evacuated to Effingham, with the pupils billeted in Bookham and Fetcham. These villages were the camps for the Canadian Engineers waiting to embark for D-Day, during which time they built the Leatherhead by-pass, called Young Street named after their commanding officer. How did the secret words get into the crosswords? Was the headmaster a spy? Did the Canadians leak words to the schoolboys or was it all a coincidence? Being a coincidence is very unlikely as in 1942, when the Canadians unsuccessfully raided Dieppe, with 800 killed, the word Dieppe had occurred in the Daily Telegraph crossword the week before.

After the war, in gratitude to the hospitality shown to the Canadians locally, they presented the friendship tree to Bookham and also one to Leatherhead at Thorncroft Manor. The tree can be viewed at any time but the marked colour difference of the leaves can best be seen in the spring. At the bottom of Young Street there is a memorial to the Canadians, and at the top a memorial to 50 years of peace.

Proposed Supermarket

This edition includes articles, on the meetings held this summer about the supermarket proposal and on the Village Plan, which recruited many volunteers as a result. The Village Plan team, following the initiation by the BRA, now acts independently and we, like many others, will contribute to it.

On the supermarket proposal, there is little further to report at present. There has been no planning application and the only communication from the developer has been a response to Mole Valley's Local Development Framework. The comments made by him are on the MVDC LDF web site and if you do not have access to the internet then a visit to the library is another option.

We know that as a result of the meeting, the MVDC Councillor responsible for the property at Lower Shott has been in communication with the shopkeepers in respect of ongoing maintenance and repairs.

The very large turnouts at the meetings showed how concerned we all are about the future of Bookham. The organisations in the village, which promote and sponsor many aspects of village life, would all welcome any help you can afford. If you can be involved, please get in touch. The Bookham Community Association, Churches Together, The Bookham Youth and Community Association Limited and we in the BRA, all would welcome help however large or small.

The Village Plan - now known as Bookham Vision

The Bookham Village Plan is now underway and a very enthusiastic Steering Group (17 people) attended the first meeting on 11th September. The Steering Group agreed that the Plan be named "Bookham Vision" with a strap line "your voice shaping our future". The work will cover all aspects of village life (not just retailingt) under four broad headings. They are:- Economic and Employment Issues, Environmental Issues, Social & Community Issues and Travel & Transport Issues.

Four Working Groups, one for each of these headings, were established to manage and carry out the work. In addition a fifth group was set up to handle all matters relating to publicity, communications and PR. We are fortunate to have attracted some very qualified and expert people in these disciplines on the Steering Committee.


The Steering Group will be chaired by Trevor Sokell with John Tiffney as the Vice Chairman. Stella Brooks was appointed Treasurer and Bob Kelley is the Secretary. In addition to the Steering Group over 50 people had volunteered to help in whatever ways they could and they all, no doubt, will be approached in the near future. Bookham is indeed lucky to have such a large number of residents willing to commit themselves to making sure it has a successful future.

Proposed supermarket in Lower Shott created much concern in the village. The BRA initiated public meetings which lead to the formation of Bookham Vision which in turn lead to Bookham Vanguard.

The Neighbour Development plan has been submitted to MVDC and will be reviewed and assuming approval there will be a referendum on the plan in May 2017.



FLOOD FORUM Michael Agius

On 10th February 2014 the Bookhan, Flood Forum held its fifth meeting. BRA er the met with representatives of SCC, MVDC, Rectory Thames Water [TW] and the National ements Trust [NT], under the Chairmanship of future County Councillor Clare Curran. Also treet attending were residents Alan and Diane and Pratt to expand on their ongoing problems at Mill Close and observer Paul Kenney from the Chobham Flood Forum. ed over As was to be expected, much of the House meeting was taken up with the problems ngerous arising from spring water flooding both and will the footway and carriageway at the works Lower Road Recreation Ground, at Manor House Lane and at The Vineries. vare of The only site where a quick solution waspossible was at The Vineries, where forts in drainage grips were dug through the repair raised verge to release the ponded Anne. water on the footway. At Manor House Lane the surface water coming from

capacity to take the large flows from the springs in what was known historically as Seven Springs Field. The only solution to improve pedestrian and vehicle safety at this location was to restrict traffic to one lane. At the time of writing the footway along Lower Road has been closed and pedestrians diverted onto the improved footpath described in the Footpath section of this Newsletter. In addition a temporary footbridge over the footway is being considered. Long term solutions at all three locations will be discussed with SCC. Photos here show the problem areas.

At the February Flood Forum updates were given on the previously identified problem areas:

- at No. 8 Mill Close, where flooding had been experienced on and off for over a year but had been continuous since early December. After much discussion it was agreed to hold a separate meeting to try and find a solution. This may well involve drainage measures in The Park being necessary
- the central area of the village i.e. Lower Road at The Crown PH, High Street, Church Road to Fife Way where SCC had carried out CCTV surveys but had yet to analyse the footage.
- · Church Road, Fife Way to Bookham Common, where TW had lined the surface water drain from Solecote to Mill Close and carried out a CCTV survey from Fife Way to the Common, which needed final analysis. Lining of the remaining lengths might cost in excess of


